



# Lawmakers OK Emissions Inspection System

CONCORD — Lawmakers have given final approval to an auto emissions inspection system that is already in place, but currently only advisory.

The House and Senate approved a compromise version of HB 513 that does not cap what service stations charge for the test or for what it costs to repair a vehicle that fails. The House passed the bill on a 273-35 vote, while the Senate approved it on an 18-5 vote.

Under the program, mechanics check on-board diagnostic (OBD) readings on vehicles from the 1996 model year and newer. Until May 1, 2006, the tests are advisory, so car owners would not have to make the repairs in order to pass the annual inspection, but they will be charged for the test.

At one time, lawmakers capped the cost of the testing fee at \$15, but federal officials said they would not approve the plan with the limit.

The advisory period also gives state officials time to develop a program of waivers so low-income car owners don't have to make expensive repairs if their vehicle fails the emissions test. Federal law includes a formula that would set the maximum cost at slightly more than \$700.

House Transportation Committee Chairman Sherman Packard said, "If you kill this bill, you will be hurting the citizens of this state because you will be killing the OBD program." He said there are protections for citizens under the bill.

The tests are required because of a 1998 agreement the state reached with the federal Environmental Protection Agency after the state exceeded maximum air pollution levels in four southern counties.

The OBD system became controversial this winter when service station owners complained the testing equipment was too expensive and would impose an unnecessary burden on their customers.

Stations pay Gordon-Darby, a Kentucky company under contract with the state, for each OBD inspection. The charge is \$5 each but stations often charge more for the tests.



# A Big Day for NH Motorists

Technology allowing easier toll collection and auto registration has arrived in New Hampshire, but there may be delays and long lines at Division of Motor Vehicles registration stations while the bugs are worked out of the new registration and title system.

In May, a changeover in software in anticipation of the new system caused the agency's 18 offices and about 80 town hall systems that process car registrations to shut down. The day-and-a-half computer glitch also caused long delays for people seeking licenses.

E-ZPass got its start at 5 a.m. on Monday, July 11. Motorists with E-ZPass accounts were able to cruise through the Hooksett and Bedford toll plazas without stopping.

"Testing continues, but we're pretty confident everything is in place," Department of Transportation public information officer Bill Boynton said of the electronic toll collection system. "The Hampton toll plaza is not the first to accept E-ZPass (transactions), because it has the highest volume (of traffic), and we want to make sure it runs correctly."

Other toll plazas were phased in over the next few weeks, with a goal of having the entire system up and running by Labor Day. People who have signed up for E-ZPass accounts should be receiving transponders for their vehicles, Boynton said. After July 11, they can be used at the New Hampshire plazas and in other states from Maine to Virginia.

As of yesterday (July 7) 37,887 accounts had been set up, with 65,589 transponders ordered, according to Boynton.

"We're pleased by the amount of interest shown so far. Now we'll have to wait and see how many people use them. We also have a built-in customer base of out-of-state users of E-ZPass that will be there right from the beginning as well," he said.

After July 15, the price of the transponders will increase from \$5 to \$27.50 due to a provision of the state budget approved by lawmakers. Gov. John Lynch and the Executive Council wanted to continue turnpike tokens and their 50 percent discount until July 1, 2007, but lawmakers voted to end sales Sept. 30 and end their use Dec. 31.

The New Hampshire E-ZPass system will provide a 30 percent discount to private users and a 10 percent discount to commercial users.

# Curbside Rubbish Pickup

Building Inspector, Steve Keany, sent the following letter to local R.E. offices:

I have received several complaints regarding curbside rubbish pickup. Under our current zoning ordinances, garbage must be stored in closed receptacles and left at the curbside on the day of collection. (It is acceptable to do this the night before.) Many residents have called my office complaining of garbage sitting on the roadside for several days. I know that the majority of rentals are from Saturday to Saturday, and that the trash is left by the departing tenants. Although the practice is convenient for the tenant and property owner, it is anything but for residents in the area.

I would like you as the rental agency to notify tenants and owners of the ordinances and insist that those responsible for the problems discontinue their actions. I have made it clear to anyone who observes rubbish along the street that has either been placed there too early or stored improperly (not in covered barrels) to call my office immediately. If the problem continues, I will be forced to begin fining the responsible parties.

We all know that Seabrook Beach is a beautiful place to live and vacation. With a little effort, we can eliminate the trash problem and keep our neighborhoods clean and safe.
















## Flag Etiquette




# **Beach Cleanup**
