

In last year's newsletter, I wrote a story about Denise Dennis and her community spirit. This was my opening paragraph: "Denise Dennis is, in her own words, 'passionate about food, flowers and books.' After spending time with her, I added people, giving, loving and more giving! This year she's back and giving even more.

For those who don't know, Denise manages the Farm Stand on Rt. 286 here in Seabrook. As those who live here already know, it's not an ordinary farm stand! She prides herself on searching out the freshest local, regional and global produce available ...every day! And Denise does emphasize, and re-emphasize, she sells QUALITY!

This year, actually in May, she has added a new dimension to her business. The 'pay it forward' program will be about adding memberships. Unlike other CSA's which limit product availability, Denise says, you, the consumer will be able to choose what you want, how much you want and when you want it! As a member, you will enjoy discount prices a minimum of 10% on purchases. There will be members' only weekly specials. Members will be able to order online at the website www.getmyproduce.com and even have their order delivered for a small fee.

Here's where the 'pay it forward' 50/50 promotion comes in. If a member donates money to our local pantries in any \$5 increment up to \$50, he/she will receive coupons worth that same amount to spend at the farm stand. The three primary recipients of this food are the St. Vincent food pantry in Hampton which serves meals and provides emergency foodstuffs to people in the area in critical circumstances, the Community Table in Seabrook which serves meals to 35-40 people three times a week, and the Our Neighbors' Table food pantry in Amesbury, MA. No small task!!

Denise is hoping that by increasing customer volume and therefore product through these memberships, she will be able to donate even more food to local food pantries and programs in Southern NH and Northern MA. Last year the farm stand donated over \$20,000 of produce.

Denise says by supporting one another and those

in need with fresh produce is how The Farm stand and Get My Produce Membership can help. Her attitude and energy are amazing!

I must not end this without thanking Denise, again this year, for the donation and diligent care of the lovely flowers and pots which welcome us as well as visitors at the lights at Rt. 286. They are a delight and we are most appreciative!!

Opening day at the farm Stand was June 20. Stop in to meet and speak to Denise, pick up a brochure to learn more about 'paying it forward' and enjoy some of her produce and homemade goodies.

Oh, yes! If you know someone in need or have ideas or ways to help others, share them with Denise. She's a 'make it happen' lady!

We would like to introduce you to Seabrook Fire Department CPR Instructor, Seth Coleman. We are pleased to announce that Seth Colman will be the guest speaker at the July 21st Seabrook Beach Civic Association meeting discussing CPR techniques as well as qualifying those interested in receiving CPR Certification.

Seth came to Seabrook from Vermont where he grew up on a farm. He met his wife, Nichole, and moved to the coast eleven years ago settling in Seabrook to pursue a fire career. Residency is a requirement for a fireman in Seabrook. As he continued on after having received his degree in health science, he took classes to become an EMT (Emergency Medical technician), more advanced classes to become an EMS(Emergency Medical Services) ultimately becoming a paramedic three years later!

Seth explained, and I found it interesting, that in New Hampshire, a paramedic, when on the road, has the similar capacity to that of an RN in that he is able to make treatment decisions on his own. Imagine the time and lives this can save!

Seth's been a paramedic for seven years but as a fireman dedicated to his career and the public he serves, he has continued on with his degree to quality as an instructor. This again has required many more practical hours and classes. This is a huge commitment and the town fortunately pays up to \$10,000 toward a fireman's schooling, as well as covering his shift, while he is fulfilling his school clinical requirements on a given work day.

In addition to his 'on land' fire duties, Seth would like to see the town purchase some reliable beach rescue vehicles for the water. That sounds like a good idea as we are surrounded by swimmers, paddlers and fishermen! We all stand to benefit from Seth's interest, ambition and fortitude!

One more mention: on the side, Seth also owns Coleman fence, a company he started with a friend in Boston. With the dependability of his department schedule of 24 hours, three days off his two jobs blend and work well.


Janet will be displaying many of her paintings while focusing on her those from her most recent workshops in France and Italy and her watercolors depicting New England.

I hope each of you will have or take an opportunity to visit with Richie who hangs in our Seabrook parking lot on the harbor on Rt. 1A. Not Fenway-but hey!

Richard (Richie) King owns the hot dog wagon and business "Richie's Hot Dogs" but also sells burgers, sausage and lobster rolls.

I had fun learning the history of his 'spot' over there and it is quite a saga at that.

Ritchie is in his 6th year as owner and operator. He bought the wagon from Eddie Brinkman who ran it for 4 years and Eddie had bought it from the original and first owner, Bucky.

Confused?

The story starts with Bucky. Lifelong Seabrook resident, Ivan Eaton, so Richie explained, issued the first operator's permit to Bucky who sold hot dogs right at that same spot for what Richie remembers as 16-18 years! Today, Richie owns that very same wagon!

He still serves the same Kayem hot dogs as did his friend Bucky and still serves some of those original customers--"lots of repeat customers" he claims and many who are just "stuck in traffic"!

This is a great 'second and third career' story. Richie, at 16 yrs. old, along with his father and older brother, started their own trucking company.

After 50 years of driving a truck, he retired in 1996. Not one to sit still, Richie drove a trolley for six years in Hampton for Tommy Higgins. He subsequently bought his own (maybe one of Tommy's) and trolleyed for three more years. It is an understatement to say he enjoys being busy!


